


Our last Annual Review showed how we responded to the challenges of the pandemic by helping those veterans who struggled with loneliness and isolation This report tells a very different story of celebration combined with lessons learned from lockdownan unexpected but successful combination.
We belatedly celebrated our centenary, thanks to the generosity of the family of our co-founder with a reception for many of our supporters and volunteers at the House of Lords at which we were delighted to welcome our Patron, HRH The Princess Royal. We also held a grand barbecue and Son et Lumiere for veterans across all three Services and of all ages at Danny House in Sussex. There could be no more special place to celebrate our foundation in 1920 as it was at Danny House that the War Cabinet agreed the terms of the Armistice in 1918.

Covid meant that for the first time since the end of World War 2 we could not hold our traditional Royal parties at Buckingham Palace and St James's Palace, but at our Patron's suggestion and with the usual Not Forgotten enthusiasm we staged drive-in concerts for veterans in the grounds of eleven astonishing country houses throughout the country including two parties in a day Gatcombe, the home of our Patron. The kindness of all those who welcomed us to their wonderful homes will stay in the memories of all those who attended the parties and has already become part of Not Forgotten history.
The celebrations continued with 101 concerts in the gardens of care homes with veterans to mark our 101st year. This was an astonishing feat of organisation, logistics and energy on the part of the entertainers, the stage crew and the caterers who covered over 1,000 miles and gave huge pleasure to over 1,000 veterans, and their partners and carers.

We did not stop during Covid and as this Review shows we have not stopped since thanks to the wonderful support of our donors, volunteers and our small team, which is now well established in our new office in Buckingham Palace Road. We can only operate from such a central location thanks to the great generosity of a benefactor to whom we are more than grateful.


I end with three farewells and a welcome.
The length of service to the charity of our former Lady President, Commandant Anthea Larken, and two former trustees, The Lord Newall and Commodore Peter Tribe is nearly 90 years. Their contribution over such a long time is immeasurable. We welcome Air Vice-Marshal Elaine West as our new Lady President.

## WHAT WE DO

Through social activities, challenges and peer support The Not Forgotten provides events which improve physical and mental health, address isolation and loneliness, and promote a sense of community and balance. This enables beneficiaries and their families to live a happier and more confident life.

Since 1920, we have supported veterans with disabilities or illness and wounded Service personnel through a tailored and varied programme of events. Our small team of 10 staff supports over 10,000 individuals each year.

OUR ANNUAL PROGRAMME CONSISTS OF:

- Royal Parties; a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace and a Christmas Party at St James's Palace, which celebrate the enduring value of service.
- Challenge/Activity Breaks, such as adaptive skiing, trekking and alpine canoeing, which inspire beneficiaries to set greater goals.
- Respite Holidays, which invigorates beneficiaries and their partners.
- Concerts in Care Homes, which bring comfort and cheer to older veterans.
- Outings and visits to prestigious sporting events such as Ascot, Twickenham and Wimbledon.
- Holiday Grants for those whose illness prevents group participation
- Provision of televisions and TV licences to those who are confined to their homes.
- Provision of tablets and laptops to those who are digitally isolated.

The Not Forgotten was founded in 1920 by American soprano Miss Marta Cunningham CBE. Having moved to Europe at the turn of the century, Marta devoted much of her time to charity work during World War I. A year after the Armistice, Marta heard that there ere perhaps a handful of wounded soldiers unde treatment at a nearby Ministry of Pensions hospital She approached the Matron, asking if she had a few onely patients who would like to come out for tea. The Matron looked surprised and revealed that she actually had 600 patients languishing in the wards.

Marta soon set about mobilising her group of friends o host these lost young men for afternoon tea and entertainment. During one of these early invitations one soldier was heard to say, "we don't want no charity, Miss, we are forgotten by everybody and we'd etter stop so." Thus, on 12th August 1920 the 'Not orgotten' Association formed for the 'comfort, orgotten Association was formed for the comfort, cheer and entertainment' of servicemen injured during he Great War. In its first year, the charity entertain some 10,000 men - a figure we still maintain today.

Eight years ago a conversation began between veterans over some beers in the kitchen, after returning from a canoeing trip on the River Spey with The Not Forgotten. The veterans wanted to do something to give back to the charity which has helped them greatly over the years. Many ideas and some scribbles later the idea of an elephant centrepiece was born.

An older elephant stands proudly next to a younger elephant, to represent the older veterans standing alongside the younger ones, who are all part of The Not Forgotten. But Johnnie Ray and Darren Swift wanted to go further, and decided they were going to include a reference to the three Forces.
"The Not Forgotten is a small, but mighty charity. We wanted to represent this with the centrepiece. Small, but in your face. On the surface, it looks simple, but there is a multi-layered story behind it." - Johnnie Ray

Sadly, however, Peter McMurray, another veteran volunteer who was instrumental in developing the project with his boundless energy and enthusiasm passed away before the centrepiece was completed. In Peter's memory, it features a small plaque in his honour.

## CHRISTMAS PARTY

By kind permission of Her Majesty The Queen, each year the The Not Forgotten hosts a Christmas Tea Party in the State Apartments of St. James's Palace. Guests were joined this year by our Patron HRH The Princess Royal and her husband Vice Admiral Sir Tim Laurence.

Taking place in the Throne, Entrée and Queen Anne Rooms, afternoon tea was served as singers, balloon modellers and magicians entertained 162 veterans and their partners, escorts and carers.

Following HRH's departure, a wonderful variet show provided comedy, magic, music and dance in the Picture Gallery, with performances from Annie Riley, Max Fox and the Universal Ents team, and a sensational dance montage by special guests Frobacks. This created the perfect end to a day ful of fun, excitement and camaraderie.

We are hugely grateful for this special privilege and would like to thank the Palace staff, the Service helpers from all three Services and the entertainers, without whom the event simply could not happen.

## HOLIDAYS \& OUTINGS

Our calendar was full once more this year, with a longawaited return to the ski slopes of Breckenridge and respite weekends on the Ashcombe Estate. Although we weren't able to run a full calendar due to the pandemic, over the year we were able to support 398 veterans and serving personnel across 15 trips.

For the first time in two years we were able to make the cross-Atlantic journey to America, where we took 26 veterans skiing in Breckenridge. Split into two groups, veterans of all abilities took to the slopes in all manner of ways. From sit-skiing to ski-biking and
blind veterans being guided down the slopes, the ski trip was a monumental moment for all those who attended, proving that disability doesn't define them and won't hold them back from anything in life.

Respite weekends on the Ashcombe Estate in Devon have become a staple in our calendar, and this year we treated 75 veterans and their partners to an activity break. The couples stayed in cottages on site and were pitted against one another with games of ladder ball, quoits, skittles, quizzes and archery. The break was an opportunity for the veterans to leave behind their stresses at home, come out of their shells, interact with like-minded people and make new friends while being active. It also gave partners the chance to relax, unwind and meet the partners of other veterans.


## ASCOT RACECOURSE

We were fortunate enough to be invited to Ascot Racecourse again this year, with a race even being dedicated to and named after the charity. 32 of ou beneficiaries were treated to a lunch in one of the suites with spectacular views of the race course. Some even brought their luck with them and truly enjoyed their day at the races.



## FISHING

This year carp fishing weekends in the South and South-West of England enabled small groups of beneficiaries to enjoy a relaxing break and forget the challenges of their injuries for a few days. The beautiful surroundings proved particularly therapeutic for those with mental health injuries and gave everyone the opportunity to bond and forge strong friendships.

Our beneficiaries were not afraid to get involved with their cars decorated in lights and baubles, veterans wearing festive dress, and many even dancing in the rain.

## TERRI AND PETER PUGSLEY-DAVIES

## STEVE DE-ASHA



Peter and Terri Pugsley-Davies are a retired RAF couple, living in the Isle of Wight. Both served in the UK, RAFG and further afield. A diagnosis of PTSD sadly began to creep up on both of them after their return to civilian life.

After being given an invitation to the Buckingham Palace Garden Party through a different organisation, Terri had experience of meeting other veterans and got a glimpse of what The Not Forgotten was about. Shortly after, they both registered as beneficiaries.
'Going to events can be scary for somebody with PTSD, but with The Not Forgotten you always feel safe. The events give us something to look forward to and surrounds us with people we can trust."

From being invited to Ashcombe respite weekends to sitting courtside at Wimbledon and marching at the Cenotaph Parade in 2021, Peter and Terri have done it all with The Not Forgotten.
"Being part of The Not Forgotten with the possibility of attending events with fellow veterans makes me feel less isolated and it is like there is light and positivity at the end of a long dark tunnel"

## ADAM JOHNSTONE



Adam Johnstone is a Royal Marine veteran who whilst playing rugby in 2016 suffered a brain injury resulting in Adam having his leg amputated in 2020. Struggling with adapting to civilian life he reached out to The Not Forgotten, who he says have been an important part of his healing journey. In his own words "The Not Forgotten have been pretty awesome in looking after me, to be honest."
"Just to get together and to be able to share stories and experiences is invaluable. It's nice to meet people in the same boat as yourself and to be able to talk through it all as a team."

Adam first experienced sit skiing with The Not Forgotten in 2019 and this year returned to further his skills in the sport. When asked what the best part of the trip was, Adam told us it was all about the camaraderie.


Steve De-Asha joined the RAF as a photographer in 2003 at 22 years old. After serving a tour in Iraq, he was medically discharged in 2010. Struggling with coming out of the military against his own terms, and losing the close bond he shared with those he served alongside, Steve felt lost.
"I felt as though l'd had millions in the bank, only to wake up bankrupt one morning. I had nobody to turn to, I had nothing to do and I had no idea where to go next."
"The Not Forgotten has changed my life beyond recognition, people have recognised a complete change in me. You have given me back my confidence and turned my world upside down in the best possible way. Through you guys, I have found myself, I have found that I am not alone and finally, I have found and forged new friendships and relationships with other veterans, a bond that can never be broken."

Fast forward to 2020 and after being hospitalised with Covid and losing his father, Steve hit a new low point in his life, and eventually turned to The Not Forgotten. After establishing a relationship with the charity and other beneficiaries, Steve says that his life turned around.

## BIANCA ROBINSON



Bianca Robinson is the wife of a veteran and beneficiary of The Not Forgotten. After finding the charity they have gone on to attend many events, and even raised money through a series of fundrasing challenges. In her own words, Bianca shares the impact of The Not Forgotten on her husband.
"The Not Forgotten Association has slowly given my husband his confidence and a bit of independence back. We are always so excited to be getting that magic envelope with The Not Forgotten Association logo through the door"
"I believe he would not have come as far as he has in his recovery without The Not Forgotten. I love seeing the 'old' husband back. The Not Forgotten gives us a time away from home but I get a break when he attends an event by himself, which is usually the fishing. I know that he will be looked after so I don't have to sit at home worrying about how he is getting on. We can not thank The Not Forgotten enough for saving our lives"

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

Our total income for the year was $£ 951,905$, a decrease of $£ 145,400$ from the previous year Our expenditure increased from $£ 1,055,799$ to $£ 1,105,260$.

Of this outlay, $95 \%$ related to charitable activity and $5 \%$ to fundraising and governance.

The Presidents and trustees were delighted to welcome Air Vice-Marshal Elaine West CBE as our Lady President on the retirement Commandant Anthea Larken after twenty-two years service.
Elaine enjoyed a full Royal Air Force career, achieving the rank of Air Vice-Marshal, prior to retiring in 2016 and transferring to the Royal Air Force Reserves.
At the time of her promotion to Air Vice-Marshal she became the highest-ranking female in the British Armed Forces and the first to hold two-star rank. She continues her association with the Armed Forces as trustee of the RAF Benevolent Fund, Vice President of RAF Ladies Rugby and a member of 601 (County of London) Squadron RAuxAF.

Elaine was appointed Commander of the British Empire in 2012 and had the honour to be appointed a Lady Usher to Her Majesty The Queen in 2021.
